The Story Behind the Picture:

Deny history, but don't disturb Cecil

In this **PhotoMail**, the controversial legacy of an old British colonial.



Rhodes' last will required that he be buried here at "World's View" in the Matobo Hills outside Bulawayo, in the country he founded and which was named after him as 'Rhodesia', now Zimbabwe. His philosophy and life's mission are well illustrated by two of many quotes attributed to him: "Remember that you are an Englishman, and have consequently

won first prize in the lottery of life." Cecil John Rhodes

"Pure philanthropy is very well in its way but philanthropy plus five percent is a good deal better." Cecil John Rhodes

DENY HISTORY, BUT DON'T DISTURB CECIL

Recently there were angry disturbances in Cape Town at the UCT (University of Cape Town) where South African students and activists successfully campaigned for the removal of a statue of Cecil John Rhodes, the 19th century British colonial who sought to impose British rule and the English language on Africa and the entire world.

This reminded me of a family visit to the Matobo Hills (previously known as the Matopos Hills) in the 1980s, where we joined the many tourists there in visiting and photographing Rhodes' grave (resulting in the photograph above, made after waiting a long time for the other tourists to leave).

The South African students claimed angrily that the Rhodes statue at the UCT was a celebration of Rhodes' "eurocentric" grand plan for a British-dominated World. In a confused denial of history, they also claimed that Rhodes was entirely responsible for the introduction of Apartheid - despite the fact that the Apartheid system was a 1948 construction of the Afrikaaner National Party rule. So it was a Dutch-Afrikaaner, not British, system and it dates some 46 years after Rhodes' 1902 death. Perhaps the complainants have not had history and arithmetic in their curriculum.

But fortunately the 91-year old President of Zimbabwe, Robert 'Bob' Mugabe, happened to be visiting South Africa, hosted by his old chum President Jacob Zuma. So Bob was on hand to lend some advice to the South Africans.

Now, Bob himself is often referred to as something of an odd sort, so it was amusing that, when asked for comment on the UCT "Rhodes Must Fall" campaign, he said of Rhodes: "He was a strange man...".

of the way, preferably six feet under, topped by a big slab of concrete just to make sure, because he also indulged in some fanciful narration of history by explaining to the South Africans:

Bob apparently appreciates the need to keep the ghosts of certain muzungus (white men) well out

"... he came to us and wanted to be buried and we have him down below in the Matopos, because that is where he wanted to die."

"So we are looking after the corpse and you have the statue. I don't know what you think we

should do. Dig him up? Perhaps his spirit might rise again, then what shall we do?" At this point Mugabe's host, Jacob, became convulsed by a fit of the giggles, as Bob concluded

"Apartheid is gone. I hope you have buried it down, like we did Rhodes".


